# Case Study

Your hygienist wants to go on vacation and take a week off.

Tax and benefit burden is 30%

No Replacement

Hygienist is paid for the time off, but no hygiene or doctor exam revenue is generated during the vacation.

## **Peak Replacement**

Peak Hygiene Revenue	\$936
Peak Hygienist Cost Per Day	-\$344
Your Hygienist Daily Vacation Cost	-\$291
Net Revenue	\$301
